

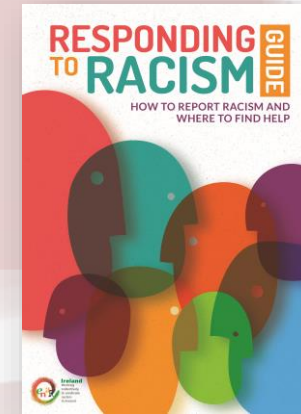

INAR understands racism as:

Any action, practice, law, speech or incident which has the effect (whether intentional or not) of undermining anyone's enjoyment of their human rights, based on their actual or perceived ethnic or national origin or background, where that background is that of a marginalised or historically subordinated group.

Racism carries connotations of violence because the dehumanisation of ethnic groups has been historically enforced through violence.

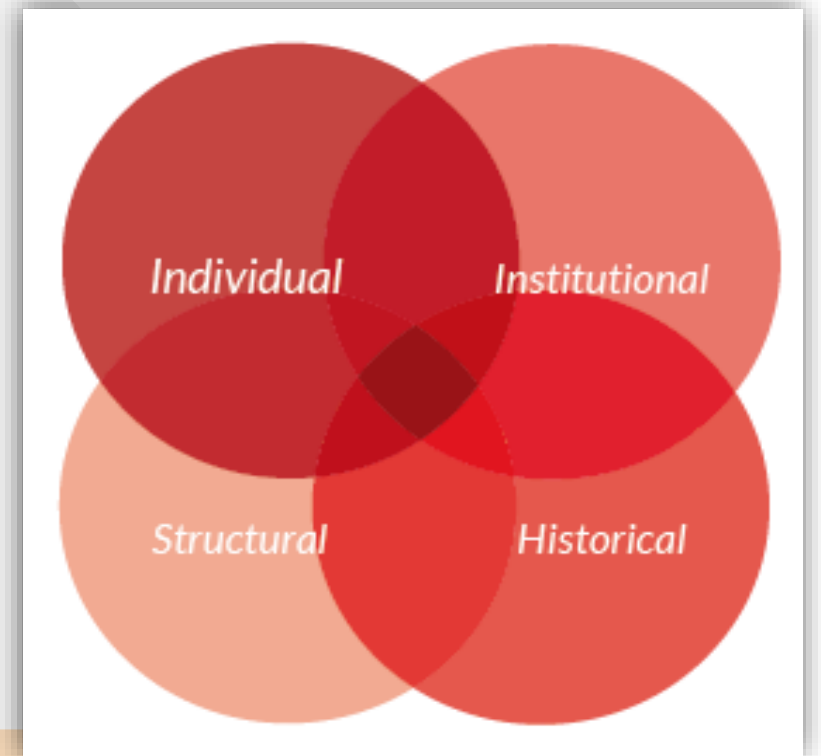
4 DIMENSIONS OF RACISM;

Racism as a **SYSTEM that RACIALISES**

Racism operates through 4 overlapping dimensions:

- ❑ **Historical**
- ❑ **Structural (societal)**
- ❑ **Institutional**
- ❑ **Individual (interpersonal)**

Structural and institutional racism create the conditions that make forms of **individual racism** seem normal and acceptable, making discrimination and violence more likely.

RACISM IN IRELAND:

IS IT COMMON?

- **700 racist incidents** incl 159 **crimes** reported to iReport.ie in 2020 – 99 Discriminatory incidents
- Black non-Irish people are **5x more likely** than white Irish people to **experience discrimination** when seeking employment. *(ESRI, 2018)*
- **62%** of Travellers felt that they were discriminated against **in school** and **61%** in **retail and places of entertainment**. *(AITHS, 2005).*
- **60.1%** of settled people would not welcome a Traveller as a member of the family *(NUI Maynooth, 2011).*

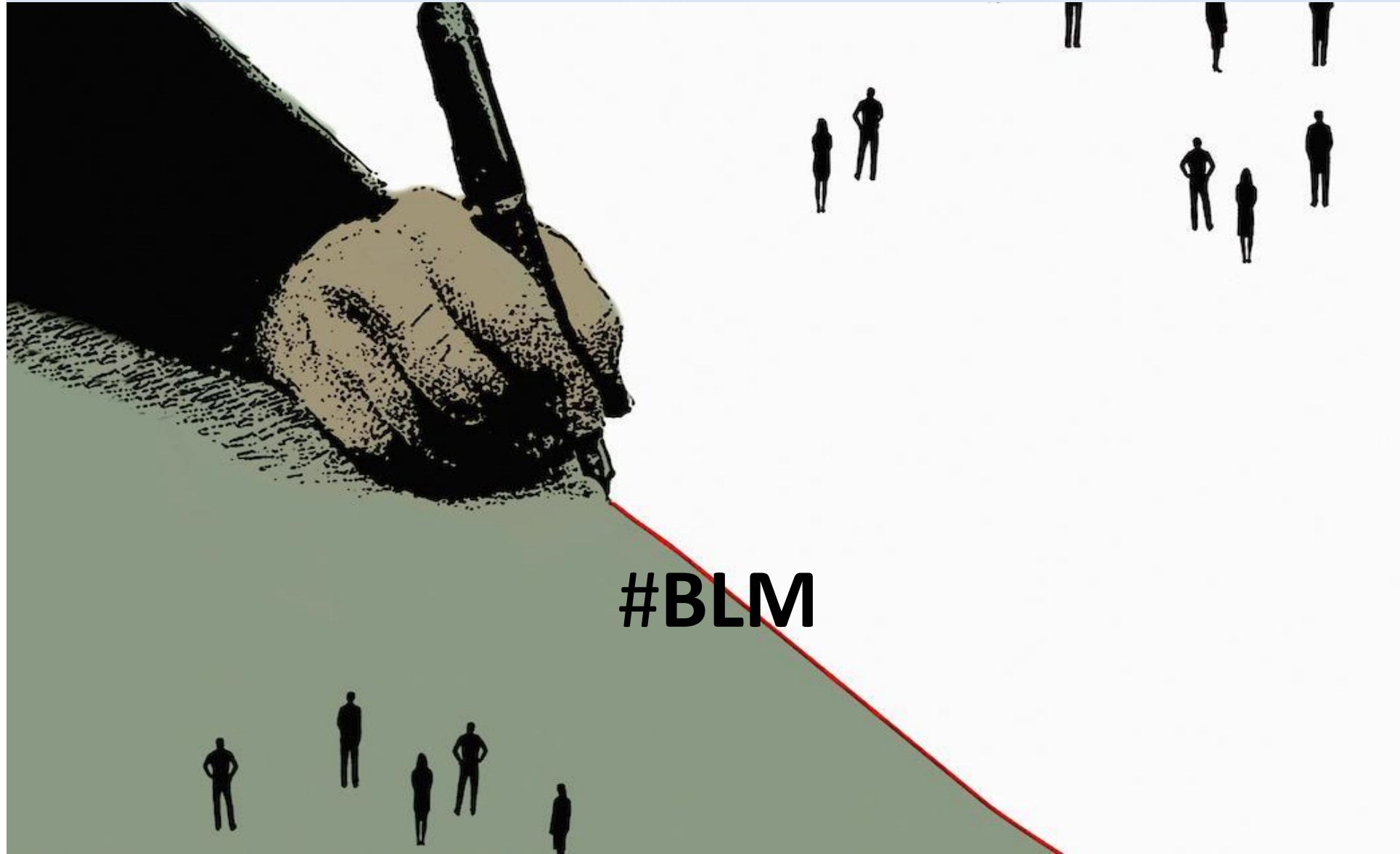
RACISM IS UNDERREPORTED

IN THE REPUBLIC OF IRELAND

- Only **1 in 6 people** report to Gardaí or other official bodies
- **70%** of racist crimes victims did not report to the police
- **34%** of discrimination cases not reported anywhere



People under-reporting racist incidents, and institutions under-recording them produces a **HUGE GAP** - between how minorities experience society and how society thinks minorities experience it



INTRODUCING iREPORT.IE:

RACIST INCIDENT REPORTING SYSTEM



- A **confidential, independent, national** reporting system to document racist incidents.
- **Who can report:** people who experienced racism, witnesses, bystanders, supporters ...
- **What can be reported:** any racist incident.
- Makes it as **easy for people to self-report.**
- **Photographs, videos, screen grabs and other files** can be uploaded.

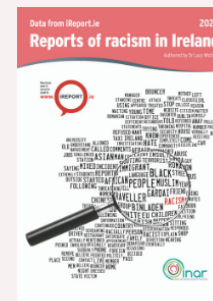

PERPETRATORS

83% 

of racist crime and abuse was by WHITE IRISH PEOPLE

50% 

were STRANGERS, not known to their victims

38% 

were acting ALONE

25% 

of assaults were committed by GROUPS OF 5+

80% 

of incidents incidents were perpetrated by ADULTS

<5% 

of perpetrators were UNDER INFLUENCE OF DRUGS OR ALCOHOL

VICTIMS

Gender



MEN were 35% more likely to be a victim of ASSAULT



MEN and WOMEN were equally likely to be a victim of OTHER ABUSE

Age



Under 18s are victims in 10 % of reports, and 15% of assaults

Impact



Psychological impacts and social isolation resulting from racist abuse and violence have more than doubled, as have financial impacts for people forced to leave jobs and move homes.

Targeted groups

33% of African descent
16% South Asian
16% Chinese/ Other Asian
17% Muslim

DISCRIMINATION



33% of African descent
20% Muslim
13% South Asian
11% Irish Traveller

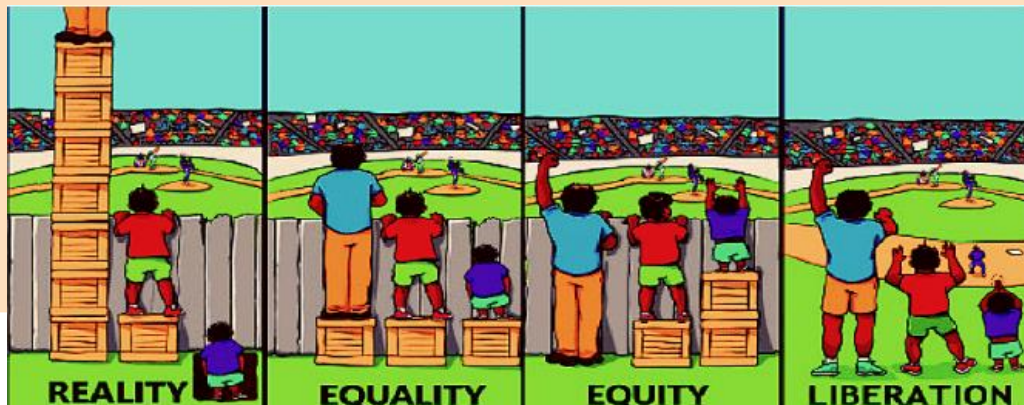
Measurability

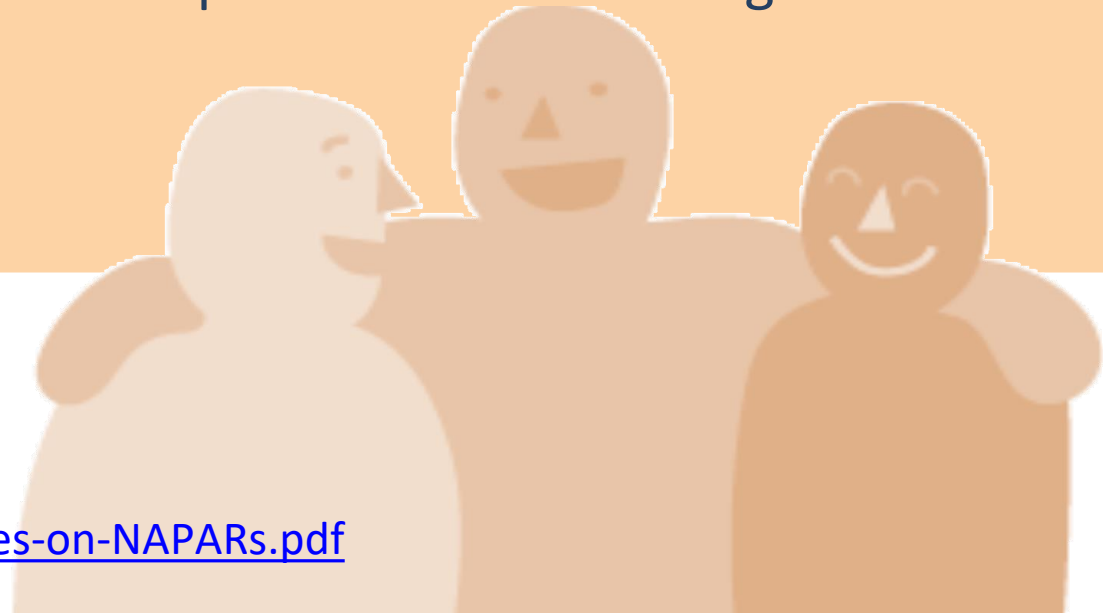

Set up to develop a 'Strategy' – persuaded that its remit should be to develop a NAPAR

A NAPAR is an integrated comprehensive multi-faceted All-government All-institution All-sector Plan containing concrete measures, resources and accountability mechanisms to tackle racism and the drivers of racism at its roots.

A NAPAR

- PROCESS : vii) Political leadership viii) Link with other government agendas ix) Local dimension x) Consultation with civil society xi) Adequate financial resources xii) Strong implementing mechanism.
- CONTENT : i) Sophisticated and comprehensive definition of racism ii) Recognises structural discrimination iii) Mentions intersectionality iv) Recognises specific forms of racism - Afrophobia, Islamophobia, Antisemitism, Antigypsyism, Anti-migrant racism v) Data collection: Comprehensive equality data collection, Attitude and experience surveys, Hate crime statistics vi) Comprehensive scope and diverse strategies.
- Should be iterative
