# Personal troubles....long list & keeps us in work & keeps us awake at night

- 10,000 adult abuse referrals to HSE in 2017
- Suicide rate among Irish Traveller men 7 times general population
- 97% of Travellers are dead by age 65
- In 2016 there were approximately 3,500 incidents of physical abuse against women in the domestic environment.
- 31% of Irish women have experienced psychological violence by a partner
- 65 million refugees worldwide – biggest number since WW2
- Almost 10,000 people homeless, including 3,500 children
